
We are so pleased to announce that this year we will celebrate the 60th anniversary of providing needed support services for children and families. The purpose of our founding in 1963, was that children with intellectual and developmental disabilities were not allowed to attend grammar school until age seven at that time. This fact was unacceptable to our founder, Mrs. Louise Schweinfurth. She approached her church Good Shepherd Lutheran in Park Forest, about using two dormant classrooms in the church building to open a school. With the physical and financial assistance of her husband, Roy, they developed the classrooms to begin early education services for these children.

Since that time, the staff at the agency has continued in the tradition of opening programs to meet the needs of the community, while staying true to our agency mission-"Good Shepherd Center, a community advocate for children and adults, with and without intellectual and developmental disabilities, provides support, service, and education that empower individuals and families to lead exceptional lives."

Programs that we offer today have all been developed to meet the needs of the community and include:

-In-Home Respite Care, which provides parents throughout south suburban Cook and northern Will counties with a much needed, occasional break so they may become energized to best meet the needs of their children and family.

Statistics are showing since COVID-19 more that 50% of children under the age of 8 are having trouble transitioning back to group settings.
